

THE AMERICAN WEST: A FRENCH APPROPRIATION

"Western: To a European, nothing is more exotic than this term, which evokes the landscapes of the American West, complete with roaming cowboys and Indians." – Jacques Portes, *Fascination and Misgivings: The United States in French Opinion, 1870-1914*, trans. Elbourne Forster (Cambridge and New York: Cambridge University Press, 2000), 87.

When Buffalo Bill's Wild West traveled to Paris in 1889, *The New York Times* reported that the display was going to be "managed to suit French ideas." What constituted "French ideas" of and investments in the cultures of the American West? This two-day symposium will explore the reception of ideas and images of the American West as they circulated and were appropriated in France in history, writing, art, visual culture, philosophy, ethnographic displays, and film. While the German and British fascination with the American West have been the subject of multiple books, there has been no parallel study of the artistic and historical role of the American West in France. This symposium begins to redress that scholarly lacuna.

Appropriations of the American West in France might be understood as examples of "cultural politics." As the art historian Martin Powers has defined it in his essay on "The Cultural Politics of the Brushstroke," published in *Art Bulletin* in June 2013, the lens of "cultural politics" can offer a structure through which to consider how national identities and mythologies have been constructed through transnational competition. Powers writes, "Cultural politics is by nature dialectical; it arises when an intellectual from one tradition interprets, or re-interprets another tradition."

This symposium asks how the American West in the French imagination has been defined dialectically to serve various cultural constituents. How and why have ideas of the West changed over time? Papers consider both the construction and reception of ideas of the American West in France and contextualize representations of various aspects of the West—such as landscape, indigenous populations, the railroad and the cowboy—within their historical moment and their trajectories. The panels consider the personages of the American West in France, the depictions of the West in art and popular culture (including film, comics, and novels), and questions of display.

The symposium is organized by the Institut national d'histoire de l'art in partnership with the research groups LARCA (Laboratoire de recherches sur les cultures Anglophones UMR 8225, Université Paris Diderot), HAR (Histoire des arts et représentations EA 4414, Université Paris-Ouest Nanterre la Défense) InTRU (Interactions, transferts, ruptures artistiques et culturelles EA 6301, Université François-Rabelais de Tours), and the Terra Foundation for American Art, with additional support from Institut Universitaire de France.

The papers will be presented in French and English.
